## *Jodi's Corner - Words from our Minister*

Today's warm air and strong breeze are evocative of late spring, but the falling leaves remind us that this season is not one of beginnings but rather of the necessary endings that create the space required for new life to take root and thrive.

The truth of this season, that all things must eventually come to an end to make way for the new, can be a hard one for us. We love so fiercely at times, and feel so profoundly, it can seem almost impossible to believe that any new life, or life in any new form, could possibly be as satisfying or nourishing or inspiring as what previously existed. So the thrill of creating or discovering new life is often wrapped in grief over loss of the old.

I am especially aware of those dual realities as we engage the process of considering the Joys and Concerns portion of our worship. It is a fact that Joys and Concerns is one of the most beloved and meaningful times in our shared worship on Sundays. At the meeting held by the Worship Associates a while back, a number of people shared how powerful they find the candles to be. It is also a fact that it is the part of worship about which I most often receive feedback- usually in the form of concern, and that the format we use is a "small church" format. It works brilliantly in small congregations, can work with great care and ongoing attention in congregations our size, and generally does not work in congregations even moderately larger.

Those in attendance at the meeting hosted by the Worship Associates agreed that we would experiment with new formats for Joys and Concerns over the next several months. We are not committed to anything but stepping into these new forms of sharing and being attentive to how they move us, how they challenge us, how they feed us- and if they don't, then figuring out exactly why not. We are going to try out several different formats for a month at a time.

We want your thoughts about these new forms...but we don't want them right away. The Worship Associates invite all of us (remember, this is an experiment for the Worship Associates, too) to sit with each new shape of Candles for a while. First impressions may mean a lot, but they also shift over time. Give each new format a fair shake- allow your experience to be whatever it is for a few weeks, and then let us know how you feel.

We will listen deeply, talk with intention and care, and see where the process leads us all.

Unitarian Universalism embraces new energies and new voices. Our own spiritual growth depends upon new people in our faith community.

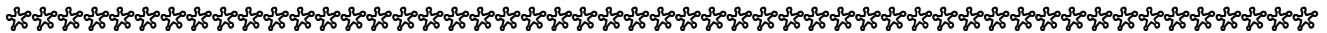

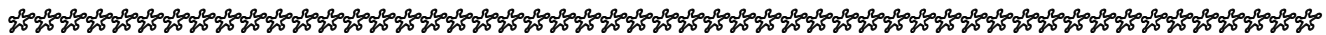
Children's Choir

## Building and Grounds

This fall our new member, Gordon Twitchell, has donated his time and landscaping skills in removing the overgrown lawn sod along our walks and around much of the church foundation, adding rubber membrane and crushed stone where sod was removed around the church. The rubber membrane was donated by the contractor who installed the rubber roofing material on each side of the church a year ago. The crushed stone came from the ledge being removed as part of the runway expansion at the Auburn Lewiston Airport and the cost of getting the stone to the church was covered by an anonymous donor. Ron Spofford has worked regularly with Gordon on this project and we thank them both for their time and energy.

Monday, October 4, during a routine walk-through the church, water was found running onto the boiler room floor from the steam boiler that heats the sanctuary. Our boiler service contractor quickly determined that the approximately 40 year old boiler was beyond repair. Within 11 days, thanks to the efforts of our local contractors and suppliers, a new boiler was in service.

Also, thanks to our Board of Directors for wisely including in our church insurance policy an endorsement for systems/equipment breakdown coverage, the largest part of the cost has been recovered. The \$1,000 deductible and the code-required installation of chimney liner and chimney cap is being mostly covered by special donations from considerate church members in

addition to their regular pledges, so there will be minimum impact on our already tight church budget. The chimney work is expected to be performed the first week of November.

Throughout this process, our water boiler of the same age, which heats the vestry, kitchen and elevator addition, remained in service.

## Social Justice Corner

### AWAP Lunch and Learn a success!

Thanks to the Cookbook Committee, our event was well-attended. If you brought a tasting lunch, thanks for supporting the work of AWAP, a group we support with our second collection.

Thanks to Victoria Williams of AWAP and Berni Mowatt of the Auburn Police Department for their presentation, "Responding as friends and family to suspected domestic abuse." If you missed it, here were the main points:

- Explain AWAP's services and Auburn PD's domestic violence response
- Understand the dynamics of abuse: that it's about a pattern of power and control!
- Identify red flags for abuse, such as quick involvement and isolation
- Identify ways to be helpful to a survivor: listen, support them where they are, offer resources and referrals such as AWAP and law enforcement.

**(NOTE: AWAP has now changed its name to Safe Voices.)**

### Anti-Casino Letter to the Editor

Anne Kinney and three others wrote the following letter to the editor of the Sun Journal on behalf of the Social Justice Committee. It appeared on October 21.

"Gambling is not Harmless"

Gambling is all about "odds." Are the odds in our favor if we vote for an Oxford County casino on Nov. 2? Social, economic and psychological costs can include increased crime rates, lost productivity, indebtedness, compulsive gambling and addictions that ruin families, increased suicide rates, need for extensive infrastructure improvements, negative impacts on local businesses, plus the overall change in the quality of life and soul of a small Maine community.

In 2006, the first full year of operations at Hollywood Slots, crime in Bangor increased 22 percent, the biggest increase of any Maine city, according to the Maine Department of Public Safety.

Gambling is not just a harmless pastime; the odds always favor the house. In the game of craps, if a gambler were to bet \$1 each time, the odds of winning \$1,000 before losing \$1,000 are one in two trillion (see "Gambling," by Bruno Leone et al).

We believe in Maine's potential to be productive and prosperous, in our quality of place, and in our entrepreneurial abilities. We believe in investing in Maine through initiatives that will truly aid small businesses, improve educational performance, promote energy efficiency, enhance connectivity, and overhaul our health care system.

We will vote no on Question 1.

### ***"YOU ARE NOT ALONE":***

#### **COMMUNITY RALLY IN SUPPORT OF GLBTQ YOUTH AT AUBURN U.U.**

At noon on Saturday, Nov. 6th, Outright Lewiston/Auburn will sponsor "*You are Not Alone*," a community rally in response to the recent string of highly publicized youth suicides. It will take place on the grounds of our church, First Universalist Church, in Auburn.

Endorsed by our church through our *Welcoming Congregation* commitment, the rally will last about an hour and will include youth and adult speakers, songs, and a display of rainbow ribbons.

Please join us to celebrate the lives of gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgendered and questioning youth, and to mourn the hundreds each year who end their own lives. This event will focus awareness on the bullying, harassment, intimidation, isolation and exclusion that devastate the lives of so many GLBTQ young people (and all those targeted as gay or 'different'). We need to visibly demonstrate to GLBTQ youth in Maine that there are resources and supportive allies available to them.

All who attend will be encouraged to leave a handprint on a poster to represent a youth who has committed suicide. The handprints will be displayed on the front windows of the Lewiston Public Library.

If you are able to participate and have a UU t-shirt, please wear it to help indicate our support as Unitarian Universalists. We will also display our Social Justice banner. Our faith, and our *Welcoming Congregation* work, especially call us to harness love's power to stop oppression, exclusion, and discrimination against anyone because of their identity. We stand on the side of love to ask all people to aspire to respect, inclusion, and compassion. Please lend your presence to this important rally to speak out against the emotional and spiritual violence inflicted upon GLBTQ people through bullying, discrimination, and, sadly, anti-gay religious rhetoric.

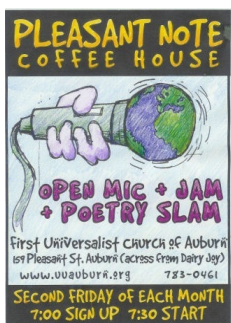
