Now I read more and clean less.

I sit on the porch without worrying about anything..

I spend more time with my family, and less at work..

I understood that life should be a source of experience to be lived up to, not survived through.

I no longer keep anything.

I use crystal glasses every day...

I'll wear new clothes to go to the supermarket, if I feel like it.

I don't save my special perfume for special occasions, I use it whenever I want to.

The words 'Someday....' and ' One Day...' are fading away from my dictionary.

If it's worth seeing, listening or doing, I want to see, listen or do it now....

I don't know what my friend's wife would have done if she knew she wouldn't be there the next morning, this nobody can tell..

I think she might have called her relatives and closest friends. She might call old friends to make peace over past quarrels. I'd like to think she would go out for Chinese, her favorite food.

It's these small things that I would regret not doing, if I knew my time had come..

Each day, each hour, each minute, is special.

Live for today, for tomorrow is promised to no-one. (Author unknown.)

This summer has been beautiful!, with so much to do and enjoy!

A couple Sundays ago I filled in for someone (Carmen-my partner) as the coffee hour host. Although it was a quiet Sunday morning, it was such a great experience. I got to speak with all kinds of people I don't usually get to talk with. I even got to meet a new couple who have just moved up from the South. they seemed really nice and excited to find a UU church in the area.

How special our group is. a place where we can gather and have fellowship and community, each being from different backgrounds, having different beliefs, all sorts of age ranges and from different places. It's such an honor to be part of this church.

Equality....A Few More Steps

Early summer has brought some gains and some disappointments for those of us working hard to secure equal rights for members of the LGBTQ community.

The Good News: The Maine House and Senate voted (with a strong bipartisan majority) to *uphold* protections in public accommodations in the state's Human Rights Act. Had these protections been repealed it would have opened the door to blatant discrimination against members of our transgender community. This is a strong victory!

This defeat of the proposed law (LD 1046), which would have removed those protections, was made possible by statewide coalitions of volunteers including the ongoing volunteerism of many Unitarian Universalists.

The Disappointing News: On the very last day of the 2011 legislative session the bill to prevent bullying in Maine schools was set aside and referred back to committee. Titled "*An Act to Prohibit Bullying in Schools*," it would have established strong anti-bullying protections for Maine students. Those of us connected to Outright youth, and all of us who care so deeply about them and other students, are especially aware of the tragic toll of bullying when schools are not safe places to be.

The bill was sent back to the Education Committee and will be reviewed in the 2012 session. It had received earlier votes of support in both the House and Senate.

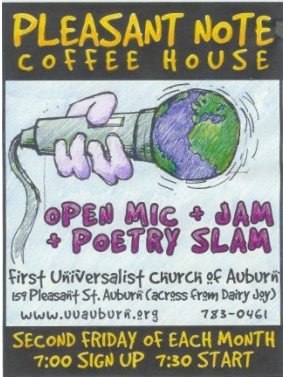
Marriage in 2012? Equality Maine and Gay and Lesbian Advocates and Defenders (GLAD) have announced an effort to win marriage equality through a statewide ballot initiative. It will ask Maine voters to grant marriage rights to same-sex couples through a citizen initiative that would pose the following question:

Do you favor a law allowing marriage licenses for same-sex couples that protects religious freedom by ensuring no religion or clergy be required to perform such a marriage in violation of their religious beliefs?

Beyond our state borders, we are further buoyed by news that New York state lawmakers passed a *Marriage Equality Act*. UU congregations there were prominent among sponsors of pro-equality faith rallies.

In addition to our interfaith coalitions, equality work continues to be advanced by Equality Maine, the Maine Civil Liberties Union, GLSEN, and GLAD. Our support of and alliances with these groups continue to be steps forward in advancing our commitment to *Standing on the Side of Love*.

A Virtual View of 50 Years of UU'ism....and Onward!

As I write this at the end of June over 4000 Unitarian Universalists are attending the annual gathering of our congregations in Charlotte, N.C. It's General Assembly (G.A.) week – and the 50th Anniversary of the merger of the Unitarians and Universalists. For the first time, there are about 40 of us participating from our homes as “trial” offsite delegates. I am fortunate to be one of those 40! My job is to connect to the convention every day, via my computer and a phone line. I can speak during business sessions at the pro or con or procedural microphones, and I can vote.

“Experimental” this is! The first day I sit in my home office at my *desktop* computer watching streaming video on a G.A. website, with my phone in one hand. My *laptop* is right here, too, connected to a voting screen where, for *only about four seconds*, a ballot is available to me when a vote is called. At 1,000 miles away from the “action,” I’m also *really* here at G.A.!

On days two and three I abandon the desktop, and sit with my laptop in my living room, with an armchair pulled up as close as possible to my telephone which is set on speaker. Now - the phone I listen to is connected *directly to the microphone* at the podium in North Carolina. But the streaming video I watch is delayed, so the two are not in synch! It is hard to get my vote in during the appropriate four seconds – and I miss several votes. Frustration! After this I return to my desktop *and* laptop *and* speaker phone... and I work it out. Regardless of the challenges, I am *very* excited to be part of this offsite adventure.

So what is happening at General Assembly? Opening ceremonies on Wednesday evening feature a stunning banner parade with a steady stream of glorious, colorful, and creative UU church banners. And at the end, the large screens in convention hall reveal a huge photo of**our Auburn UU banner** (!), which I had sent in to be displayed with the banners of a few other offsite delegates. It looks so beautiful - - and there our Rose Window glows on behalf of all of us.

We vote to adopt a “*Statement of Conscience*” (in the works for three years) about *Ethical Eating*. It calls for us to become aware of the ways that our food choices affect our health and the planet’s health.

We review our impressive 50 years as a justice-seeking people...in a sometimes messy, sometimes flawed journey of opening our hearts and minds. We UU’s have been outspoken leaders in advocating for peace, racial equality, civil rights, women’s equality, economic justice, lgbtq rights, environmental stewardship, and immigration reform, to name a few. It’s *really* important to know that two of our ministers gave their lives in Selma. And that it was our own UU Beacon Press which published *The Pentagon Papers*.

Our UUA President, Rev. Peter Morales, speaks to us during a workshop about three things he sees we need to do to grow into the future:

- *Get out of our comfort zones* – What are we passionate about that we can work on together to move us forward as a **religious community**? It needs to be both emotional and experiential.
- *Grow leaders* – How do we identify, nurture, and empower the natural leaders already in our congregations? We need to enable people to act upon their deepest convictions and highest ideals.
- *Break borders* – Can we find structured, intentional ways to get out of our class and cultural limitations? We need to create worship and community partnerships to provide safe ways to be exposed to differences.

The American Muslim whose *Park51 Community Center* project in lower Manhattan was vilified as the so-called “*Ground Zero Mosque*” last year, is one of the featured speakers. He is Imam Feisal Abdul Rauf, and he talks about the common ground between core Muslim values and core American values.
